Change your password whenever you want - or not!

Since July, over 19 300 staff members, third parties and students have already changed their password using the upgraded Password Self-Service system. The system allows staff and third parties to create a password that won't ever expire, while retaining the freedom to change their password whenever they want to. Students will, however, still be required to change their password every 90 days.

When you first access the system, you will be prompted to provide a mobile number and alternate (non-UCT) email address. This is in the event that you lose or forget your password. If you do forget your password, you can go to Password Self-Service and Click Forgot Password. A one-time password token will be sent to your mobile number or alternate address. Make the change and you are good to go. If this information is not listed, you'll need to seek help - with students able to visit the ICTS Front Office or a student lab administrator, while staff and third parties can log a call with the IT

Staff and third parties only have until the end of the year to access the new system and change their passwords. Don't worry though, the change is quick and simple. To help you through this process, we have created step-by-step instructions on how to create your new password or to reset it.

lynda.com's learning matrix makes it easy to select courses

One of lynda.com's greatest strengths is that it allows you to learn a new skill at a pace that suits you. You can create Design

your own learning path and decide when you want to learn new design, IT, 3D + animation, audio, marketing and business skills. The bitesized video clips also makes it easier to learn a specific skill in a short amount of time - using your computer or mobile device.

With over 3000 courses to choose from, lynda.com has developed the learning matrix functionality which gives you a quick overview as to what courses are available under a specific topic. Once you have logged on to lynda.com, scroll down on the home page and click on the learning matrix centre block. Once the Learning Matrix Center page loads, select a category that

interests you, or hover over a block for more information on that category. Once you select a category, the range of courses appear. The colour-coded blocks indicate the skill levels of each course and by using the filter, you can select courses suitable for your level.



Microsoft Word 2013 includes many features to help you efficiently complete documents that require special formatting. During the Intermediate course, our trainers will show you how to manage lists, customise tables, styles and themes, modify pictures, insert content using quick parts, use templates to automate document creation and conduct mail merges. The course takes place 4-7 November 2014 (13:30-16:30).

ICTS has made it easier to access lynda.com by linking the site to UCT's Single Sign-On. If you're off campus, you don't need to use EZProxy to access lynda.com. Simply visit lynda.uct.ac.za and log on using your staff/student number and UCT password. If you haven't accessed lynda.com since the changeover in September, you will be prompted to enter your previous lynda.com login details so that your history can be transferred to your new profile.

Software carpentry boot camp offers software development skills to researchers

While the term "boot camp" usually refers to intense fitness training at an army base or a gym, the "software carpentry boot camp" is not as strenuous. Instead it aims to teach best practices for research software development.

Software Carpentry (SWC) is a volunteer organisation teaching basic scientific computing skills to researchers in the science, engineering, and

medicine fields. In the past year alone, over 100 events have been attended by thousands of people.

Jonah Duckles (University of Oklahoma, USA), James Hetherington (University College London, UK), JC Leyder (European



Space Astronomy Centre, Spain) and David Merand (University of the Witwatersrand, SA) will run the boot camp from 27-28 November 2014. The event, which costs R500 per person, will take place at UCT's newly built Snape Building on Upper Campus.

During the two-day training session, attendees will learn how to manage version control, automate repetitive tasks, learn the basics of programming using Python as well as track and share work efficiently using Git and GitHub. Attendees should bring their own laptop and have the necessary software installed before the course begins. This will give them a ready-made working environment that they can use immediately after the boot camp is complete.
