# Cyber Safety month helps to combat online dangers

Over the past few years, there's been a definite shift in the way that people stay connected. While desktop computers and laptops used to be the preferred choices for working and networking, nowadays, more and more people rely on their tablets and smartphones to stay in touch. As a result, hackers

are finding alternative methods to access our personal information.

One way is via the applications (apps) that we install on our mobile devices. While many applications can be trusted, some cannot, because

they've been developed with sinister intentions - such as causing serious damage to the mobile device or unnecessarily accessing personal information.

During this year's Cyber Safety Month, which is currently underway, we highlight some of the factors to consider before installing an app on your mobile device. In addition to this, we're also focussing on cyber bullying - which has become more prominent across the world, and online scams - which are always a risk in today's web-enabled world.

Throughout the month we will highlight the potential risks you could encounter and will advise you on how to protect yourself from these dangers. We've also included safety checklists that can help you to remain safe online.

# Things could go wrong if your data is not managed properly

If you publish data in a journal, chances are that you might get requests from people wanting to access your datasets. You therefore need to ensure that your data is saved in a file format that prospective users can open. It is also handy to have a reference guide to accompany the datasets, especially if you use abbreviations or terms that people may not be aware of.

It is also imperative to save the data in a secure location which not only makes it easy to find, but also ensures your data is protected and easily available when required. This video by the New York University's Health Sciences Libraries highlights some of the problems and queries that could arise if your data is not managed and stored correctly.

# Outlook 2013 for Windows now available

Microsoft has added a new and more efficient system of navigation between email, contacts, calendar and tasks in Outlook 2013 which is now available for installation at UCT. This system makes cross-checking tasks, appointments and contacts' availability easier. They have also cleaned up the interface making the mailbox display more accessible and easier to scan quickly.

If you tend to forget to add your attachments to email messages, then you will find the attachment reminder useful. Outlook 2013 detects if an

### **Upgrade to Windows 7 before time runs out**

In less than six months, Microsoft will no longer support
Windows XP. This means that from April 2014
staff and students still using this operating
system will no longer receive support or
Windows XP

patches and updates from Microsoft. ICTS will also no longer be

able to support these machines of internal which could pose a security risk to the UCT network.

To help you to check if your machine is Windows 7-compatible ICTS has created the *CanRunWin7* tool which checks your machine's processor, system memory, display and hardware capabilities.



When determining a minimum spec, UCT takes into consideration the base software requirements, updates, McAfee anti-virus and ZenWorks to ensure that your machine will run at optimum levels.

Should your PC or laptop not meet UCT's minimum requirements, you will either need to purchase a new machine or buy the required hardware. You can contact the ICTS Acquisitions

Services team for a quotation or for advice on what machine to buy. If your machine is able to run Windows 7, then contact the IT Helpdesk before 31 December 2013 for assistance with the upgrade. There are some steps that you'll need to take before your machine can be upgraded.

We recommend that you upgrade to Windows 7 before the end of year, as January to April is one of the Helpdesk's busiest periods and there may be a delay in getting your machine upgraded in time.

### Facebook "Likes" can say a lot about you

How many times have you read, watched or listened to something on the Internet that you enjoyed and then clicked the Facebook *Like* button? The item would then appear on your Facebook page and your friends can see what you are interested in. What you might not know is that by simply clicking the Like button you may be sharing information about yourself that you would prefer to keep private.

Researchers at Cambridge University have successfully determined that private traits and attributes are predictable when using digital records of human behaviour. They conducted a study using Facebook Likes of more than 58 000 volunteers and were able to correctly predict ethnic origin, religion, personality traits, IQ, age, gender, relationship status and substance abuse. This information was then corroborated with the volunteers' demographic profiles and their psychometric testing results which was conducted via the myPersonality application.

Using statistical models they were 95% accurate in distinguishing African-American from Caucasian American and in 93% of the cases male and females were correctly predicted.
